What do we value at the University of Kentucky?

Only a few weeks into an academic year, I am repeatedly reminded how that question can take shape and be expressed on a college campus. Diverse perspectives about the world we share are expressed every day on the campus we share – as students, staff, faculty, and visitors alike.
